literature: long view

- ▶ Literature is writing that is socially and culturally marked as distinctive.
 - ▶ What is marked changes.
 - ▶ How the distinction is marked changes.
 - ▶ The significance of the distinction changes.

review: Dickinson

- ▶ “Tell all the truth but tell it slant”
 - ▶ an exhortation to be indirect
 - ▶ an argument whose “logic” is...questionable
 - ▶ effects vs. contents / *what* is said vs. *how*

how to think about words

- ▶ the words matter...but what do they mean?
- ▶ metaphor is a special case of something very general:
 - ▶ meaning depends on a rich communicative context
 - ▶ we take only some of the implications of words and sentences
 - ▶ we supplement with assumptions of our own
- ▶ “He’s a beast!” (traditional: Achilles is a lion)
